Dear Friends,

Welcome to September, when we dare to ask the question, *“What if...”* *What if God has a different plan? What if I’m not seeing the whole picture? What if I miss out because I drew a line in the sand? What if God can do more than I can think or even imagine? What if...* Fill in the blank for yourself.

Our lectionary readings for worship during the month of September are from the Gospel of Luke. Throughout the five weeks we’ll discover so many ways that God can take the ordinary and transform it into extraordinary. Jesus teaches how great honor is born from sincere humility. (Luke 14:7-14) He encourages every Christian disciple to be prepared for the cost of discipleship. (Luke 14:25-33) Have you considered lately just how precious you are in God’s eyes? Here I am, Lord! Is it I Lord? I have heard you calling...

There are ample ways that you – yes, you – might choose to use your gifts for the purpose of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. Too often, the nudging of the Holy Spirit to put your faith into action gets muffled by a cacophony of other voices. Take a moment to be quiet and listen to God’s instruction. Set aside the busy-ness, the hesitations, the doubt and pick up the rewards of ministry – joy, new growth, enthusiasm, and deep, deep satisfaction that come with serving Christ.

Explore these Servant Opportunities:

Weekly Offering Counter – The church needs a team of 4-8 individuals who will spend approximately one hour each Monday counting and depositing the weekly offerings.

Communion Servers – Holy Communion is celebrated on the first Sunday of every month and in special services in both the traditional and Celebration. Communion Servers, along with the pastors, are “table waiters” who serve the bread and juice. The time commitment is during worship and the frequency you serve is up to you.

Shepherd Group – Our shepherds help keep watch over the flock and the church grounds. By simply walking around outside or standing at one of the church entrances before during or after worship you can help identify situations or persons that pose a danger to others. Training is available and the time commitment you make is determined by how often you sign up for the shepherd rotation.

Staff/Pastor Parish Relations Committee - In every size congregation, the staff/pastor-parish relations committee (S/PPRC) must focus on building strong relationships between the staff and the congregation, and the congregation and the district superintendent. The time commitment for this committee ranges from 2-8 hours per month.

Trustee - As a trustee, you will supervise and maintain all property belonging to your congregation so that the ministries of the congregation can be effective.

Our church also has a very active **Missions Committee**, sponsor of the Blinn College Welcoming & Water Distribution Event, multiple service projects on Sunday mornings, the summer library snack bags, and involvement in local efforts to alleviate suffering, such as membership in the Washington County Food Security Network.

If you’ve been welcomed when you arrived for worship or if you’ve noticed that first time worship guests receive a church mug, then you know our **Evangelism Committee** has been hard at work. By service through Evangelism Committee, you’ll get to know so many people, help them feel welcome, and help our church reach out to those who don’t yet have a church home.

TEXAS ANNUAL CONFERENCE 2019

REPORT TO FIRST UNITED METHODIST CHURCH OF BRENHAM, TX

This is my report to the church on this year's annual conference that took place May 26-29 at the Hilton Americas hotel in Houston.

The bulk of the time was spent on normal, transactional business processes that you would expect for an annual meeting of an organization this large. Reports were given from the various offices of the conference. Budgets were approved. All of this was done under a strict set of guidelines. There were also luncheons and dinners throughout the conference sponsored by different groups and prayer and inspirational breaks during each day.

There were three celebration/services as in the past. One was for retiring pastors. Another was for pastors deceased over the last year. The last was an ordination service. It felt a little odd to me to go to services in a hotel. They were fine but not as inspirational (to me) as last year's at the Woodlands UMC.

There were two resolutions to be voted on. One would have reduced the number of districts in the conference by one (although our West District would not have been affected). The other would have slightly reduced staffing at the conference level. Both measures failed to pass.

Our church did very well in the awards area. We received three. The first was an Archivist Award to our member Bill Hardt for his work in cataloging and preserving conference history. The second was the Copeland Award to the church for most confirmations in the 201-300 average attendance at worship class. The third was a Rising Star Award for our Sunday school attendance. Thanks to all of you that helped make these happen.



A Moment In Time

Last month's historical sketch related how African Americans in Washington County left the Southern branch of Methodism. This month we will see that German speaking Methodists also found a new home in another denomination after the Civil War.

The first and most important German settlement in pre-Civil War Texas was Industry, just to the southwest of Brenham. Its founder, Friedrich Ernst, wrote letters home extolling the beauty and fertility of the land. After the formation of the Adelsverein to promote German immigration, Industry became a crucial stop on the way to the land grants in the Hill County.

The stereotypical view of German religion—Catholic in the South, Lutheran in the North—obscures a more complex reality. German immigrants to Texas also included a large number with a pietistic inclination, and they were ripe for the message Methodist circuit riders were bringing. On the eve of the Civil War both the Texas Conference and the Rio Grande Mission Conference (today's Rio Texas) of the MECS had German districts which included a church at Industry.

The end of the Civil War presented Germans with same problem it presented African Americans—to stay in the MECS or join another denomination. The Presiding Elder of the Austin District of the MECS which included the Hill Country German churches convened a meeting and told them basically that the denomination was flat broke and could not continue mission payments to the churches. The MEC, on the other hand was relatively well off and had a vigorous publishing concern in Cincinnati that produced German language Disciplines, Bible commentaries, tracts, Sunday School literature, and newspapers for the German speaking conferences that stretched from New York to Iowa. Even before the war, MECS Germans were using publications from the MEC.

The MECS pastor at Industry, Carl Biel, took the lead and changed his church's affiliation from MECS to MEC. When the Texas Conference of the MEC was formed in January 1867, it consisted of about 70 African American preachers and 3 Germans—all of whom were from Industry. More Germans were to follow.

As the German Methodists prospered, they had a problem. The closest German Methodist school where aspiring preachers could go for ministerial training was in Iowa. In 1883 that problem was solved with the creation of Blinn Memorial College at the 4th Street Church. The college began with the pastor, Carl Urbantke, and three students, but from those modest origins came a mighty force for education and evangelism.

The founding of Blinn shifted the center of Texas German Methodist from Industry to Brenham. Young men studying for the ministry could attend classes all week and then go serve a church thanks to Brenham's rail connections. The efforts of the student pastors and transfers from the northern conferences led to the establishment of German MEC churches in all directions from Brenham. The 4th Street Church became a favored site for holding Annual Conference. Thanks to Blinn Memorial College, Brenham became the only town in Texas in which the MEC and MECS churches were roughly equal in size and influence.

Assimilation of German speakers into the English speaking world and the anti-German sentiment associated with World War I diminished the need for Blinn's historic role. When the Depression hit, the church lost control of the school, but Washington County voters created a special district to turn it into a public institution.

The next time you are on the Blinn campus, take some time to look at "Old Main" and remember its Methodist heritage.

Not an organ recital, rather an ORGAN STOPS TOUR

A goodly number of our FUMC congregation participated on August 16th in a delightful personalized tour of four churches in the Brazos Valley area. The purpose of the tour was to see, hear and, most importantly, learn about each of their magnificent pipe organs.



The first stop on the tour was the First Presbyterian Church in Navasota. There our Music Director, traveling host, and all-round "good guy" Matt Hulon explained the basic mechanics of an organ and the function of the numerous "stops" that are set to create a multitude of different sounds. From the one instrument we heard trumpets, oboes and a gentle tinkling of bells. Matt ultimately incorporated these tools in a brief, but entertaining "recital."

Matt stepped aside at our next stop, the St. Thomas Episcopal Church in College Station. From Church personnel hosts, including their organist Ms. Bonnie Harris-Reynolds, we were told about the history of the Church's organ, as well as the original keyboard instrument the "Hydraulis" from ca. 270 B.C. Ms. Harris-Reynolds then offered short selections on the Church organ that highlighted the different instrument stops. She followed this with an explanation and demonstration of the Church's beautiful, small harpsichord. (Did you know that the strings of a harpsichord are plucked, not struck?)



Our lunch break was followed by a visit to the sanctuary of College Station's A&M Methodist Church where we were entertained by an obviously knowledgeable and talented church organist, Dr. Junjin Kim. Although Ms. Kim also provided our group with additional information about the mechanics of this particular instrument and its 2,585 pipes, it was

perhaps the thunderous yet melodious product she produced from the organ during another short "recital" that was most impressive.

Our fourth and final stop was to Bryan's First United Methodist Church. There we were learned of the history of this old church and were able to sing hymns along with the music from another majestic organ. At the end of a full, productive, and most enjoyable day, perhaps the words of Ms. Harris-Reynolds, the organist at St. Thomas Episcopal, were still lingering with most of us: "Organ music is painting with sound." Accordingly, to our own "artist extraordinaire" Matt Hulon, many thanks for all you did from the first to the last "stop."

And even more is yet to come with another tour planned for the spring.


